# Government-funded students and courses 2020

# **Highlights**

In 2020, 1 191 400 students were enrolled in government-funded vocational education and training (VET). They included:

- 1 141 300 students enrolled in nationally recognised training
- 92 300 students enrolled in non-nationally recognised training.

In 2020, compared with 2019:

- student numbers increased by 3.5% to 1 191 400
- full-year training equivalents (FYTEs) decreased by 11.7% to 433 300
- students enrolled in nationally recognised programs increased by 1.3% to 1 005 800
- students enrolled in stand-alone nationally recognised subjects decreased by 22.2% to 27 100
- students enrolled in non-nationally recognised training decreased by 18.6% to 92 300.

An estimated 7.0% of the Australian resident population aged 15 to 64 years participated in government-funded VET in Australia in 2020.

#### From 2016 to 2020:

• student numbers have decreased by 1.0% to 1 191 400.

# **Summary**

# Students and participation

In 2020, 1 191 400 students were enrolled in government-funded VET, an increase of 3.5% from 2019.

An estimated 7.0% of the Australian resident population aged 15 to 64 years participated in government-funded VET in 2020. Participation was highest among those aged 15 to 19 years (at 18.4%).

Some students enrolled in one or more programs, others in stand-alone subjects, and some in a combination of both.

In 2020, 1 141 300 government-funded students were enrolled in nationally recognised VET, consisting of:

- training package qualifications (887 800 or 77.8% of students undertaking nationally recognised VET)
- accredited qualifications (84 700 students or 7.4%)
- training package skill sets (38 300 students or 3.4%)
- accredited courses (30 900 students or 2.7%)
- locally developed skill sets and courses comprised of at least one nationally recognised subject (146 400 students or 12.8%)
- stand-alone nationally recognised subjects (27 100 students or 2.4%).




Figure 1 Government-funded students enrolled in nationally recognised training, 2019 and 2020 (%)

In 2020, 92 300 government-funded students were enrolled in non-nationally recognised VET, consisting of:


- non-nationally recognised programs (70 100 students)
- non-nationally recognised stand-alone subjects (22 400 students).

In 2020, compared with 2019, the number of government-funded full-year training equivalents (FYTEs) decreased by 57 300 to 433 300 (down 11.7%).

# Students by state/territory

In 2020, compared to 2019, the number of government-funded students increased in New South Wales, Queensland and Western Australia, and decreased in all other states and territories.

# Students by training provider

In 2020, 671 400 government-funded students (56.4%) were enrolled at TAFE institutes, 55 500 (4.7%) at other government providers, 56 300 (4.7%) at community education providers, 363 300 (30.5%) at private training providers, and 88 700 (7.4%) at other training providers.

# **Program enrolments**

In 2020, there were 1 408 100 enrolments in government-funded programs, an increase of 2.6% from 2019.

#### Of these:

- 77.2% were in qualifications, including training package qualifications (70.4%) and accredited qualifications (6.8%)
- 5.1% were in training package skill sets and accredited courses
- 12.1% were in locally developed programs comprised of at least one nationally recognised subject
- 5.5% were in non-nationally recognised programs.

In 2020, Society and culture was the most popular field of education with 211 100 (15.0%) government-funded program enrolments, followed by Engineering and related technologies with 206 200 (14.6%).



In 2020, the highest number of government-funded nationally recognised qualification enrolments were in certificate III at 515 100 (47.4%) followed by certificate IV (19.1%) and certificate II (14.8%).


Figure 5 Government-funded nationally recognised qualification enrolments by level of education, 2019 and 2020



# **Qualification completions**

Preliminary numbers show 298 300 government-funded qualification completions in 2020. This number will be revised upwards with the release of *Government-funded students and courses 2021*. In 2020, the highest number of government-funded qualification completions were at certificate III level with 138 000 (46.3% of all qualification completions), followed by certificate II (20.5%), and certificate IV (16.9%).

Figure 8 Government-funded full-year training equivalents, 2003 to 2020 ('000)




Figure 9 Government-funded program enrolments, 2003 to 2020 (million)





Figure 10 Government-funded qualification completions, 2003 to 2019 ('000)
